6.0 CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER AND STAFF REPORTS

6.1 Legislative Update

Pam Bender presented a legislative update. She stated that when a bill is chaptered it means it has been approved and will be implemented. Pam also reported that the legislature will reconvene January 2024 with the Governor's budget being released on January 10, 2024. Pam highlighted that for Senate Bill (SB) 323, emergency safety procedures do not have to be included in student IEPs but instead must be included in the school emergency plan. Regarding Assembly Bill (AB) 1466, it was stressed that seclusion is not allowed in the educational setting. Pam reviewed the requirements implemented in AB 1722 – Pupil Health: credentialed school nurses, registered nurses, and licensed vocational nurses. Pam confirmed that schools do not need to have a nurse on site, only available to the site.

6.2 SEIS Transition Update

Pam Bender provided a SEIS transition update. She said most of the charter LEAs have been entering their IEPs in SEIS. For the LEAs that are submitting for CAHELP assistance, IEPs that are labeled as Priority are done within 1-2 days of receipt. Priority means a parent called and is requesting an amendment so the eligibility evaluation or plan review needs to be entered right away. There are approximately 30 staff who have been trained to do the data entry with some doing it after hours, during down time in their workday, and some on weekends. Handwritten forms are more time consuming than typed ones because that eliminates the ability to copy and paste the data. Pam shared that DMSELPA has received 1444 IEPs with 563 completed. Pam explained the current focus is on IEPs held July 1-October 4, 2023 because pupil count is due December 15, 2023. Pam said if any LEAs need assistance with the initial affirming to let Colette Garland know.

Colette Garland thanked the committee members for their patience during the transition. She shared that records are being sent to CalPads already.

Danielle Cote suggested letting parents know before their scheduled IEP that there is a new system with a different look to the forms to help ease worry and concern.

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6.3 Desert Mountain Children's Center Client Services Reports and Update

Daisie Lambert presented the Desert Mountain Children's Center Client Services monthly reports and updates. She shared the monthly mental health research article topic of helping students during the holiday season.

6.4 Professional Learning Summary and Update

Heidi Chavez presented the Desert Mountain Charter SELPA's Professional Learning Summary and updates. She stated the Community Advisory Committee (CAC) meeting is scheduled virtually for November 16, 2023. It is imperative that participants register so they can receive the link to attend. The SLP Collaborative is scheduled for January 17, 2024 with the topic of Nonbiased assessment for English learners with potential developmental language disorder. The iMTSS Symposium is scheduled for February 21, 2024 at the Doubletree Hotel in Ontario, California with a cost of \$250.00 per person. The next CAC meeting is scheduled for February 22, 2024 and will be provided by the CAHELP JPA Outreach Team. Heidi continued that HOLA Language Services training is scheduled for November 29-30, 2024 and is for any staff that assist with translating in IEPs so they can be legally compliant. The fee for HOLA training is \$200.00.

6.5 Resolution Support Services Summary and Update

Lisa Nash presented the Desert Mountain Charter SELPA's Resolution Support Services Summary and update.

6.6 Compliance Update

Peggy Dunn presented an update on compliance items from the California Department of Education (CDE). She shared that LEAs have been asked by CDE to provide feedback to help them improve future monitoring cycles. Step 3 of Compliance and Improvement Monitoring Process (CIM) is currently underway with a window of October 1-November 30, 2023. Peggy needs to receive all plans by November 30 so the DMCS assurances can be submitted to CDE. She reminded any LEAs in Small Schools Monitoring to submit required documents as requested.

6.7 Career Technical Education Update

Deborah Sarkesian provided the Career Technical Education (CTE) update. She shared that as of November 15, 2023, they have received 259 referrals and their goal is 275. The deadline for referrals is November 17, 2023. If the goal is not met, Deborah said an email will be sent to the teachers offering first come first serve enrollment. Deborah reported the instructional supply deadline is December 31, 2023 which allows teachers \$250 to use for purchasing program supplies.

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6.8 Prevention and Intervention Update

Deborah Sarkesian provided the Prevention and Intervention update. She reported onsite requests have been for scaling up Tier 1 Supports and Interventions to help prevent overload in Tiers 2 and 3. There has also been an increase in requests for providing PBIS in the home as well as understanding classroom management supports. As a parent of two children with IEPs, Deborah thanked the committee members for what they do for special education students. She is thankful for their hard work and all they do.

7.0 INFORMATION ITEMS

7.1 Monthly Occupational & Physical Therapy Services Reports

Codi Andersen referred to SB 323 and stated that the PT and OT staff can support LEAs in addressing how to ensure students are safe during emergencies. She said the LEAs can contact her with any questions or if assistance is needed. Codi also shared that California will pass regulations that as of March 2024, occupational therapists will be considered licensed mental health providers. Codi continued that currently OT and PT services are offered at Tier 3 MTSS but DMSELPA is envisioning an infrastructure that will provide solid interventions for Tiers 1 and 2 including OT and PT. It is in the planning phase with possible pilot studies this school year that can include providing for students in general education and not just those with IEPs.

Pam Bender shared that at the October meeting, there was discussion about the California Association of School Psychologists (CASP) memo regarding Larry P. Pam reported she has received legal opinion from an attorney as well as discussion with State SELPA, since the law has not changed the view of the CDE has not changed. She continued that the Office of Administrative Hearings will base their decisions on what CDE follows so DMSELPA and Desert Mountain Charter SELPA will not change their stance at this time.

Pam read a poem by Henri Frederic Amiel "Thankfulness is the beginning of gratitude. Gratitude is the completion of thankfulness. Thankfulness may consist merely of words. Gratitude is shown in acts." She also read "Beginning of November" from Innergrowth Reset.

Pam wished the attendees a Happy Thanksgiving with hopes of spending time with friends and family.



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How a Bill Becomes a Law – California School House Rock

- The Legislature operates on a two-year legislative session
- Non-urgency bills require a majority vote in each house for approval, while urgency bills require
 a supermajority (two-thirds) vote in each house for approval
 - Urgency bills and budget bills go into effect immediately upon the Governor's signature
 - Non-urgency bills go into effect at the beginning of the new calendar year (or later)




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State Budget Process

MENTAL HEALTH TRENDS REPORT

DECEMBER 1, 2023

As we continue to keep an eye on the state of mental health of our youth, one of the symptoms of increased stress and mental health challenges is the use of alcohol, tobacco, and other drugs to help ameliorate the effects of these difficulties. It is essential to recognize that substance use among young people can have serious consequences on their physical and mental health. Substance use and abuse can interfere with cognitive development, academic performance, and can lead to addiction issues later in life. While substance use rates had been steadily declining prior to the shutdown due to COVID-19 in 2020, the number of deaths due to overdoses in youth has been steadily climbing.

The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) conducts the National Survey on Drug Use and Health (NSDUH) annually. This survey gives us an opportunity to see trends in substance use and abuse from year to year. The NSDUH has been conducted by the federal government since 1971 and is a primary source of statistical information on substance use and mental health of the civilian, noninstitutionalized population 12 years of age or older in the United States (US).

The NSDUH measures:

- Use of illegal drugs, prescription drugs, alcohol, and tobacco
- Substance use disorder and substance use treatment
- Major depressive episodes, mental illness, and mental health care

Perceived recovery from substance use and mental health issues

Here are some of the things we learned from the 2022 NSDUH1:

- Of the U.S. population aged 12 years and older
 - Approximately 49% drank alcohol
 - 18% used tobacco products
 - 8% vaped nicotine
 - Approximately 17% used an illicit drug
- 2. Adolescents aged 12-17
 - 7% used tobacco products or vaped nicotine
 - Of those, 73% used only vape nicotine products
 - 15% drank alcohol in the past month
 - Of those, 3% were binge drinkers
 - Approximately 12% used marijuana
 - Approximately 9% had a Substance Use Disorder (SUD)
 - Approximately 20% had a past year major depressive episode (MDE)
 - Approximately 15% had a past year MDE with severe impairment
 - Adolescents with MDE were more likely to use illicit drugs
 - 26% with MDE used illicit drugs vs 12% without MDE

The percentages for all categories in the adolescent category show a slight increase from the past year, 2021, numbers. Unfortunately, due to methodological changes to the survey in 2021 it is difficult to compare the numbers to prior years.

This past year, Children Now, a nonpartisan, whole-child research, policy development, and advocacy organization, also conducted a survey of substance use by California (CA) youth. This survey found that the substances most often used by California's youth are alcohol and marijuana.² They also found that by 11th grade, nearly a quarter of CA youth are actively

using alcohol and drugs. It is important to note that the earlier a person begins to use alcohol and other drugs the higher the likelihood of developing a SUD.³

Some of the stressors that cause teens and young children to turn to alcohol and other drugs for comfort include:

- Houselessness
- Poverty
- Systemic inequities
- Other mental health challenges and/or symptoms
- Not feeling connected to their school community
- Being members of the Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer/Questioning (LGBTQ+) community

The report, along with countless other research across the nation, also showed that despite similar rates of drug use among different racial and socioeconomic groups, Black, brown, and poor youth are more likely to be targeted, arrested, and prosecuted for drug offenses that their white and higher income counterparts. The increased presence of police officers on school campuses has led to an increase of young people being arrested for drug related offenses. The criminalization of drug use and abuse has not helped lead young people to seek and receive treatment as needed. This particular report highlights the need to see substance use as an issue of health and wellbeing, rather than a moral failing and to increase education regarding decreasing the stigma that surrounds people who use and abuse substances in order to encourage individuals to seek help and treatment.

We have talked about some of the consequences of youth using substances, mostly focusing on the mental health aspects but the consequences can be wide-ranging and have significant impacts on various aspects of their lives. Here are some potential additional ways that substance use, and abuse can affect a young person's life:

• Physical Health Issues:

- Substance use can lead to immediate and long-term health problems, including damage to the liver, heart, and lungs.
- Increased risk of accidents and injuries due to impaired judgment and coordination while under the influence.

Academic and Cognitive Impairment:

- Substance use can negatively impact academic performance, leading to poor grades and decreased educational attainment.
- Impaired cognitive function, memory, and learning abilities.

Impact on Development:

 Substance use during adolescence can interfere with normal brain development, potentially affecting decision-making and impulse control.

Social and Interpersonal Consequences:

- Strained relationships with family and friends due to changes in behavior and priorities.
- Increased likelihood of engaging in risky behaviors that can lead to legal issues.

Prevention efforts, education, and support systems are crucial in minimizing the risks associated with youth substance use. Open communication between parents, educators, and young individuals can play a key role in addressing these issues and promoting healthier choices. One such program is the "Talk. They Hear You." public education campaign.⁴ This campaign, sponsored by SAMHSA, includes information caregivers and educators regarding how to talk to young people regarding alcohol and other drug use. The campaign includes handouts, posters, and social media campaigns that can be easily incorporated into the school setting.

We also need to talk about the current opioid epidemic and overdose crisis we are facing as a nation. In 2021, fentanyl deaths accounted for more than 80% of all drug-related deaths for youth in California.⁵ It does appear that efforts to mitigate fentanyl deaths are working as

the number of deaths in CA dropped in 2022⁶ but there is still much work to be done. The CA Department of Public Health (DPH) has information and resources available for schools to implement policies and education campaigns specifically related to this topic.⁷


